CLASS FLASH

May 14, 1952

Good evening ladies and gentlemen. This is your social newscaster, Margaret Haynes, speaking to you from station WDC, that brings you the news once each day, located on the third floor of Blackwell's Bird Building, owned and operated by Glen Blackwell and Clem Tomlinson, right here in the center of Washington. At the present time all of the birds are at peace and I'm not expecting any interruption during the broadcast unless my secretary, Mary Slusher, or a parrot come fluttering in with a breezy bit of news.

Tonight I'm paying especial tribute to Morristown, Tennessee, my home town, and to the high school graduates of 1943, who after working hard (at least some people call it that) for the past nine years have become very successful (?).

Miss Holdway's place in the Spanish Department of MHS and after six years they have realized their mistake. I might add that at last Otis Blanken has gotten the courage to ask Shirley to be his wife. He was prompted to take this drastic step by John Harrison, who seems to be well-experienced along these lines.

Speaking of teachers, more former students have accepted positions with the faculty. Sarah Jane Noe and Ina Stansberry now have complete control of the Home Ec. Courses. We hope! With June Allen and Blanch Wilder in the Chemistry Department anything can happen and usually does.

Mrs. Louis V. Bean and Mrs. Bryan Sanders, formerly Mildred Gilbert and Anna F. Collins have been seen together lately buying furnishings for their new duplex, which was built next door to the Hamblen County Jail. conveniently located for their husbands, who are employed there to keep order and peace (?).

Betty Jones also told me that my favorite beauty operators, Mary Nell Wade, Alma Harville, and Mae Young have opened a new beauty salon on Henry St. Frances Cupp and Marion Roddy, their most faithful customers, had an accident recently. While singeing their eyelashes the machine got out of control burning them badly. Dr. Charles Woods was called and much to their sorrow they remained alive.

When I asked what had become of Nancy McMahan I was told that she is still unable to make up her mind whether to become the wife of a Chief Petty Officer in the Navy or marry and live "down on the farm". Fred Ewing, owner of "Dairy Products For Every Occasion", causes more complications in this case.

There I observed Major Howard Taylor and Captain Harold McNabb, Army Air Corps officials and well comfirmed bachelors, talking with Martha Nowlin, author of many history books, presumably about the tactics of World War II. Lt. Ed Rader and Pfc. Kenneth Morrison had some comments about their various escapades and thrilling experiences in this war. Rear Admiral James French was seen expressing his views on this subject.
