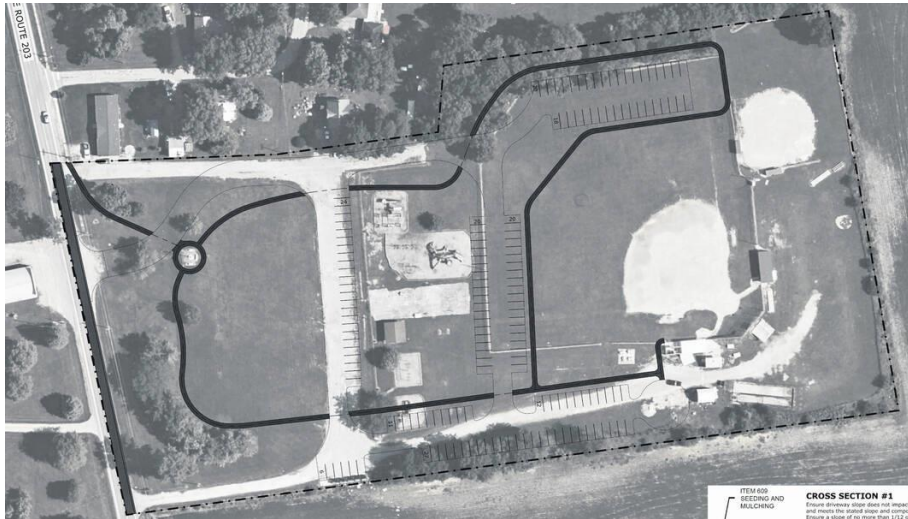


Radnor Twp. unveils park upgrades

More than seven months after breaking ground on the project, Radnor Township has unveiled several improvements at Radnor Community Park.

On June 27, the township hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the park, located at 4230 State Route 203, to celebrate the completion of the project. Among the improvements, which were carried out by MLC Construction Services, LLC, were a relocated and consolidated park entrance, enhanced parking and circulation, and a half-mile recreational trail that includes a 2,000-foot loop.

The new entrance to Radnor Community Park is centralized around the historic flagpole, a landmark that remains following the demolition of the old Radnor School. The entrance also features a commemorative plaque honoring the history of the site and the former school. The improvements were primarily financed through an Ohio Department of Natural Resources grant, which is provided via the state's biannual budget.

"The Radnor Township Board of Trustees extends sincere thanks to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, and to State Senator Andrew Brenner and State Representative Beth Lear, for their support in securing these vital funds," the township said in a release.

Along with the grant funding, the project was also funded by donations and volunteer labor and equipment, ensuring there was no direct cost to local taxpayers.

"Seeing this project completed is a proud moment for our township," Radnor Township Trustee Dan Boysel added.

Fellow Radnor Township Trustee Cameron James said, "Our heartfelt thanks go to MLS Construction Services for their outstanding work, and to National Lime and Stone and Hensel Ready Mix for their generous donations of materials. This park is a wonderful example of what our community can accomplish when we work together."

In addition to celebrating the completed project, the township board also announced that an additional \$100,000 in grant funding has been secured from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, which will be included in the 2026-28 budget cycle. According to the township, the funds will help advance the next phase of improvements at Radnor Community Park.

"With another \$100,000 now secured for the 2026–28 budget cycle, we are ready to keep building on this momentum," Radnor Township Trustee Donna Meyer said. "We invite our residents to share their ideas for what comes next, and to join us as volunteers and donors as we continue to improve this park for generations to come."

Joe Clase, planner with Plan 4 Land, LLC, said of the next phase, "We have been collaborating with the Radnor Parks Committee to identify additional improvements for the park. The park plan is being updated to plan for an enhanced playground, new pickleball courts, an additional shelter house, and other amenities as future funding becomes available."

The committee is actively seeking community input on which improvements to pursue next, as well as volunteers to help carry out the work and donations to help complete additional projects.
